Long-Term Funding for Australian Artists and Curators

The Dr. K. David G. Edwards & Margery Edwards Charitable Giving Fund Supports New York Residencies at ISCP in Perpetuity; Australia Council for the Arts Commits Additional Funding

The International Studio & Curatorial Program (ISCP) announces a new funding partnership for Australian artists and curators to participate in ISCP's esteemed visual arts residency program for many years to come. A donor-advised fund, designated by the late Dr. K. David G. Edwards, and honoring his late wife, the Australian Abstract Expressionist painter Margery Edwards, will support these residencies in perpetuity, administered by the Renaissance Charitable Foundation.

Edwards Charitable Giving Fund provides a springboard for talented emerging and mid-level artists and curators from Australia, offering them the unique opportunity to develop their practices through annual three-month residencies at ISCP. The next residency has been awarded to Taloi Havini and will take place December 2017-February 2018.

From 2018 through 2020, to complement this prestigious award, the Australia Council for the Arts has committed significant additional support, extending the annual residency period to five months. The Australia Council will also provide a stipend to cover airfare, housing and living expenses for the successful candidates; and will oversee the selection process during those three years, through an open call and a panel of arts professionals. The next open call is now open as of October 11, 2017. Australia Council Executive Director of Strategic Development and Advocacy, Wendy Were commented, "The Australia Council was delighted to renew its support for the program which would provide opportunities for Australian artists to further their professional development in New York. The Australia Council has had a long-standing commitment to the International Studio and Curatorial Program, supporting more than 30 Australian contemporary artists and curators to take part in residencies since 2005."

Benefits of an ISCP residency include access to a 24-hour private studio space and participation in ISCP's robust program of activities such as visits to New York City museums, galleries, and cultural venues; regular one-on-one meetings with distinguished local and international art professionals; participation in public talks; and production of bodies of work, or curatorial projects, that are presented to over 1,000 public visitors during ISCP's biannual Open Studios.

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Prior to Kenneth David Gilmore Edward's death in 2016, his family trust sponsored 18 Australian artists and curators at ISCP, including renowned artists Daniel Boyd, Max Pam and Gabriella & Silvana Mangano, and curators such as Susan Gibb. Candidates for those residencies were selected by a rotating nominating committee, including Bree Richards, Curator, Contemporary Art Practice – Global at the National Gallery of Australia; Simon Maidment, Senior Curator of Contemporary Art at the National Gallery of Victoria; Amy Barrett-Lennard, Director of the Perth Institute of Contemporary Arts; and Emma Crimmings, Assistant Director at Artbank. In 1974, David and Margery Edwards moved to New York City for Dr. Edwards's research career in the medical field. Margery Edwards credited the move to New York City as a shifting point in her artistic career. It was here that she dedicated time to her practice and found her signature style of abstract painting and collage, which prevailed in 1940s and 1950s American art. Margery Edwards' work has been exhibited worldwide in major galleries, universities and in collections throughout the world, including the Metropolitan Museum of Art, Art Gallery of New South Wales National Gallery of Australia and the National Gallery of Canada. David Edwards made the acquaintance of ISCP's founding director, Dennis Elliott, and began to support Australian residencies at the organization in 2007. Both Dr. David and Margery Edwards were involved in philanthropy, art and culture for many years. ISCP is proud to be among the beneficiaries of their generous vision and long-term pledge to foster growth and exchange within a global contemporary art world. The grant reiterates the importance of a continued bridge between the Australian and New York City artistic scenes.
