Opening alongside Open Studios, *Factory Makers*

initiates a four-part exhibition over the next year that takes ISCP's site of production – a historic printing factory – as the starting point to reflect on the changing nature and idea of work in society and how we define labor today. This exhibition presents seven international artists who address the impact of the world's rapidly changing economies on new social and cultural realities. Through various approaches, the included works consider the effect of globalization, new modes of 'outsourced' production and the blurring boundaries of material and immaterial labor. A 1978 work by Mladen Šimović begins the exhibition and asserts non-productivity as critical to the creation of art.

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

### BOARD MEMBERS:

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### 220 | ELISABETH BYRE | NORWAY

At ISCP Open Studios, Mugaas will show the video Skin Flick. Filmed in 16mm and transferred to HD video, Skin Flick is a 20-minute loop of a car hood moving through the city, with a soundtrack by Oliver Lyon. The city is reflected across the hood and a double reflection is created on the windshield. Mugaas graduated from The Cooper Union of the Advancement of Science and Art. In recent years, her exhibition activity includes the solo show Some Cities at the Bergen Kunsthalle and at Galley Riis in Oslo. In 2009, Mugaas started the zine album with Elise Storsveen, which was launched at Project 0047 in Oslo.

### 221 | ELISABETH BYRE | NORWAY

Elisabeth Byre is an independent curator based in Oslo, Norway. During the last three years, her curatorial practice focused mainly on performance art, often in relation to media-based work. Recent projects and exhibitions in Norway include Everyone Got Something Great (co-curator Susanne Ø. Saether) at the National Theater, Oslo, Lessons in the Art of Falling Photographs of Norwegian Performance and Process Art 1956-2009 (co-curator Janus Ekeberg), at Preus National Museum of Photography, Horten, and Storyteller – Organizing Time and Space, at Project 0047, Oslo. She holds a curatorial degree from CuratorLab at Konstfack, University College of Arts Crafts and Design in Stockholm, Sweden.

### 301 | MARINELLA SENATORE | ITALY

Marinella Senatore is based in Rome and Madrid. A selection of her public projects are presented at Open Studios. She attended the National Film School, Rome, the Fine Art School in Naples and is now completing a PhD in Public Art at the University of Castilla - La Mancha, Madrid. In a socio-political dimension, Senatore takes the role of facilitator or mediator and in her projects, written with groups of people (neighborhood associations, rappers and miners) the viewer becomes participant (as actors, technicians and producers). Her work has been exhibited at Museum Boijmans Van Beuningen, Rotterdam; Moderna Museet, Stockholm and MCA, Chicago.

### 302 | MICHAEL JONES MCKEAN | USA

Based in Virginia, Michael Jones McKean primarily works in sculpture, exploring narration, complexity, representation, misunderstanding, materiality and failure. While at ISCP, McKean is working on new sculptures, organizing a public project slated for spring of 2011 and is completing a text on meaning, sculpture and eminiscence. McKean has received numerous awards including a 2010/11 Guggenheim Fellowship and a recent Nancy Graves Foundation Award.

### 303 | DUSICA DRAŽIĆ | SERBIA

Dusica Dražić lives and works in Belgrade. Her practice focuses on installation and performance, with an emphasis on their impermanency. She searches for abandoned and forgotten spaces in the urban structure of modern cities and explores their transformation, cultural continuity, symbolic irregularities and individual actions. She has a MFA in Public Art and New Artistic Strategies from the Bauhaus University, Weimar. In 2010, Dražić received the Dimitrije Bačićević Mangleš Award, Serbia and the Young European Artist Trieste Contemporanea Award, Italy.

### 304 | LORETA UKSHINI | KOSOVO

Loreta Ujkani, based in Pristina, graduated from the University of Fine Arts, Department of Painting in 2006. Since then, she has departed from the traditional practices taught at the school in order to address matters regarding the state of her country, often problematizing the relationship between citizen and state. By bringing forward matters that are sometimes uncomfortable, her performances, installations and sculptures aim to create awareness and initiate dialogue with its audience.

### 305 | PIETRO RUFFO | ITALY

Rome-based artist Pietro Ruffo's paintings, drawings and sculptural installations reflect his intense social and moral concerns. While at ISCP, Ruffo is working on a project entitled The rise of liberalist thought in the U.S.A. He has exhibited his work at M.A.D Museum, New York; Tenerife Espacio de Las Artes (TEA); Schondeling Kunstverein-Langenhangen, Germany; MAXXI, Rome; MACRO Museum, Rome; M.A.R Museum of Ravenna and La Pescheria Museum of Contemporary Art, Pesaro.

## 108 | SZabolcs KissPál | HUNGARY

Szabolcs KissPál lives and works in Budapest. During Open Studios, he presents a selection of videos as well as new objects and installations dealing with notions of time and money, work and crisis involving Karl Marx, Jesus and "America's best real estate agent". KissPál's works were presented in various Hungarian and international contexts including Kunsthalle Budapest; apexart, Venice Biennial; Stedelijk Museum Amsterdam and Seoul International Media Art Biennale.



### 109 | OK HYUN AHN | SOUTH KOREA

Ok Hyun Ahn lives and works in Brooklyn. Her recent photos and videos explore the kinds of emotions that are presented on stage, asserting that after all, emotions are portrayed, nothing remains but tears. Hyun Ahn recently exhibited at the Photographic Center Northwest, Seattle and Houston Center for Photography. She has a MFA in Photography, Video and the Related Medias from the School of Visual Arts.

### 110 | PETER GREGORIO | USA

Peter Gregorio is a New York-based artist working in large-scale painting, print, video and installation. ### 201 | NICOLÁS GRUM | CHILE

Nicolás Grum is based in Santiago and presents *Nothing could be Something...*, a multi-disciplinary project created during his ISCP residency. His work is developed through diverse mediums including video, drawing and installation and usually contains irony and humor. During the last two years, Grum has exhibited his work at the Triennale de Chile, 2009; Beijing Biennial, 2009 and several group shows in Rio de Janeiro, São Paulo, Buenos Aires, Berlin and Shanghai.

### 202 | CHAO-TSAI CHIU | TAIWAN

Chao-Tsai Chiu is based in Taipei. The World of Fatigue is shown in Open Studios, which embodies his witty and stress-free artistic approach. Chiu's work focuses on interactive mechanisms and he obtained a MFA from Taipei National University of the Arts. He recently showed his work at the 2010 Kuandu Biennale PLUS / Memories and Beyond in Taipei.



### 203 | TANIA CANDIANI | MEXICO

Tania Candiani lives and works in Mexico City and Tijuana. Classic Six, her ongoing multi-disciplinary and site-specific project is shown at Open Studios. This work is based on apartment buildings that were emblematic during a particular historical moment in New York, marking a change in housing tastes and trends by the wealthy class. Candiani's work has been exhibited in museums in Mexico, the United States, Spain, Poland, Lithuania and Cairo. She will have an upcoming solo show at Laboratorio de Arte Alameda and a mid-career retrospective at Museo Carrillo Gil, both in Mexico City, in addition to a forthcoming publication including the past ten years of her artistic production.

### 204 | BERTILLE BAK | FRANCE

Bertille Bak is based in Paris, France and presents *Urban Chronicle*, a work in progress. Her practice is composed of videos, drawings and objects and specifically deals with the inhabitants of a mining town in northern France where she is from, but generally reflects on community and group participation in a cultural and social context. Bak received the Gilles Dusen Award, The Hiscox Start Award and the Edward Steichen Award.

## 205 | ISABELLE CORNARD | FRANCE

Paris-based artist, Isabelle Cornard, presents new drawings dealing with issues such as systems of representation and the creative gesture. These drawings are part of her trans-disciplinary practice which includes the use of cultural objects and images like transposition of classical paintings, casts of kitsch domestic objects, etc.). Recently, Cornard exhibited in group shows at Galleria d'Arte Moderna e Contemporanea, Bergamo, Italy; Raven Row, London, UK and had several solo exhibitions in galleries and institutions including La Ferme du Buisson, Noisiel, France; Kunstverein Düsseldorf, Germany and Gallery Balice Hertling, Paris, France.

### 206 | CHAW EI THEIN | BURMA

Chaw Ei Thein is a Burmese artist. She shows her recent and previous work focused on the social and political in Open Studios. Using painting, performance and installation, she has exhibited and lectured extensively and presented her installation September Sweetness at the 2008 Singapore Biennale. She has performed in arts festivals in Thailand, Taiwan, China, Japan and Canada. Thein was the founder and curator of the Sunflower Art Gallery, Rangoon, Burma. She showed her work at the Puffin Room, Soapbox Gallery and Fandom Gallery.

### 207 | CHRISTIAN SCHMIDT-RASMUSSEN | DENMARK

Christian Schmidt-Rasmussen lives and works in Copenhagen and his practice is divided between landscape paintings of his neighborhood and writing which is a hybrid between, essay, fiction, autobiography and poetry. He studied at Det Kongelige Danske Kunstakademie and his last solo show was Daywalker, let go at Ovrigaden Institute for Contemporary Art, Denmark.

### 208 | CLAUDIA KAPP | GERMANY

Claudia Kapp lives in New York and Berlin. In her performances, spatial interventions, and videos, Kapp takes up sceneries of the everyday and has them appear curiously inflated and mysterious. Formulae from Minimal or Conceptual Art are playfully reinterpreted or alienated. Claudia Kapp lives in New York and Berlin. One of her last projects was *Cold Turkey – An Invitation* at KW Institute for Contemporary Art, Berlin, 2010.

### 209 | MARYAM NAJD | BELGIUM

Maryam Najd, based in Antwerp, looks at the phonetic similarities between acts of aggression (war) and sexuality (pornography), in various media. At ISCP, she shows her Flags series, which is linked to the aftermath of 9/11. In this series, Najd creates an installation of 195 national flags – tribalistic identities – and reduces their iconographies to unrecognizable abstractions. In 2011, she will be an artist-in-residence at Künstlerhaus Bethanien, Berlin and the Flags series will be featured at S.M.A.K. in Ghent, Belgium.

### 210 | REGINE MÜLLER-WALDECK | GERMANY

Regine Müller-Waldeck is based in Leipzig, where she also received her Meisterschüler degree in 2008. During Open Studios, Müller-Waldeck will show installations and a series of small works and concepts related to her ISCP residency. Working with sculptures, ensembles and installations, her pieces transmit images that at first sight seem harmless or playful. They look in need of protection due to their fragile construction and staging, but subsequently shift to the uncanny.

### 211 | ANA SANTOS | PORTUGAL

Ana Santos lives and works in Lisbon and for Open Studios presents *Visual Essays*, where she corresponds images found in books or on the internet to others she takes with her own camera. In this process, she tries to establish a relation to the work developed by Aby Warburg in "Mnemosyne". In the case of Warburg, the gesture is intended as a "crystal of historical memory"; however, Santos works with the gesture as the key element connecting her work to the viewer. Santos has a MA in Contemporary Culture and New Technologies from the Universidade Nova de Lisboa.

### 212 | MARIAN DREW | AUSTRALIA

Marian Drew is based in Brisbane, and presents a selection of still life works from the series *Australiana/Every Living Thing* for Open Studios. These works are photographs of Australian roadkill, represented within the context of the European food still life painting genre. Drew utilizes beauty to draw viewers closer to ideas of life, death, progress and sacrifice through photography, video, drawing and installation. She teaches at Queensland College of Art, Brisbane.

## 213 | JONGGEON LEE | SOUTH KOREA

Jongeon Lee is based in Brooklyn and presents his recent architectural installations including the *Bridge of Paradise* and *In Between Nature* at Open Studios. He received a MFA in Sculpture at Rhode Island School of Design and a BFA at Seoul National University. He has exhibited his work in New York, Boston, Providence and Seoul and was awarded grants and residencies from Socrates Sculpture Park, Fine Arts Works Center, Vermont Studio Center and Changdong National Art Studio.

## 214 | NADJA VERENA MARCIN | GERMANY

Nadja Verena Marcin is based in New York. She is internationally recognized in the field of New Genre and her work focuses on human behavior, elemental emotions and psychological responses. Her work was selected for multiple grants, biennials, film festivals and exhibitions, including *Qui Vive?* Moscow International Biennale for Young Art; MoMA, New York; ICA, Philadelphia; and the Berkeley Art Museum. She received a Fulbright Award in 2007.

## 215 | MAGNUS THIERFELDER | SWEDEN

Based in Malmö, Magnus Thierfelder uses various methods such as drawing, installation, sculpture and photo. In his work, components primarily taken from the cityscape become metaphors in a narrative rebus where lamp posts, pipes, cables and paving-stones constitute elements in a symbolic realm that refer to enigmatic regularities, order and disorder, resistance, and creativity. Thierfelder's work has been shown at Montehermoso, Vitoria-Gasteiz; Ta Space, Kowloon; Moderna Museet, Stockholm; Art/Be KUNST, Bolzano; Christina Wilson, Copenhagen; The Breeder, Athens; Elastic, Malmö and Von Bartha Garage, Basel.





## 216 | F4 | NEW ZEALAND

F4 are from New Zealand and show a narrative, self-portrait, photo-based installation for Open Studios. In 2006, Marcus Williams and Susan Jowsey's long-term artistic collaboration became formalized in the collective F4, with the inclusion of their two children. Their work unfolds through multiple iterations and remains the intellectual property of the collective. The mediated nature of socialization in contemporary culture and the implications of power relations in these contexts remain broad themes in their collaborative model.

## 217 | JINNY YU | CANADA

Born in South Korea and based in Ottawa, Jinny Yu is a painter whose work considers the complexities of visual spatiality and materiality. Her primary work shown in Open Studios is a site-specific painting dealing with the question of boundary between illusion (pictorial space) and reality (materiality) in painting. She is Associate Professor of Painting at the University of Ottawa and has shown widely in Canada and elsewhere, including exhibitions at the Bevilacqua La Masa Foundation, Venice; Kyoto Municipal Museum of Art, Kyoto; Conduit Street Gallery, Sotheby's, London, UK; Carleton University Art Gallery, Ottawa; Taehwa River Eco Art Festival, Ulsan City and McMaster Museum of Art, Hamilton.

## 218 | CHRISTOPH WEBER | AUSTRIA

For Open Studios, Vienna-based artist Christoph Weber presents new works dealing with the fragility of concrete, turning material against its purpose in various ways such as in *Untitled (Zementsprayung)*. He recently showed his work in *Psychosculptures*, Vleeshal, Middelburg, The Netherlands, and in the solo show *loose concrete*, at Galerie Naechst St. Stephan, Vienna. Upcoming exhibitions include Galerie Jocelyn Wolff, Paris and The Independent, New York.

## 219 | RENZO MARTENS | THE NETHERLANDS

Renzo Martens, based in Antwerp, Amsterdam and Kinshasa, presents some fragments of Episode 3, the film registration of his activities in Congo. In an epic journey through the Congo's swamps, institutions and battlefields, Martens launches an emancipation program that helps the population embrace their biggest capital: images of poverty. The piece was exhibited at the Berlin Biennial; The Stedelijk Museum, Amsterdam; Kunsthuis Graz and Tate Modern.

### 101 | BIRTHE BLAUTH | GERMANY

Munich-based conceptual and video artist, Birthe Blauth, presents video works that examine human individuality in the tension between cultural, biographical and neurological parameters. Her image sequences playfully combine fiction with reality and their subtle variations prompt the observer to question his or her own perceptions. Blauth will mount a solo exhibition in Bonn, Germany in 2011, where she will be awarded the Bundes-GEOKK-Kunstpreis.

### 102 | SVETLANA KUYUMOZHIEVA | BULGARIA

Svetlana Kuyumzhieva is an art critic and curator based in Sofia. She holds a MA in Art History from the National Academy of Arts, Sofia. Her research work and curatorial practice is centered around the relation between the aesthetics of form and current social and political issues, and involves the new generation of Bulgarian artists. Since 2003, she has been the curator of the CIBANK Gallery in Sofia. In 2008, she co-founded the Art Affairs and Documents Foundation.

Christian Friedrich, based in Amsterdam, was born in Freiburg, Germany in 1977. He studied Fine Arts, Protestant Theology and German Philology and received a MFA at the Academy of Fine Arts in Karlsruhe and a Diploma in Protestant Theology at the University of Tübingen and Heidelberg. From 2007 to 2009, he participated in the studio program of De Ateliers in Amsterdam. His most recent solo exhibitions include *People Going Home to Die* at Galerie Foss Welters in Amsterdam and *Narcissus Standing Erected* at the Städtische Galerie, Karlsruhe, Germany.

### 104 | SOOKOON ANG | SINGAPORE

Her work surveys the depths of ordinary existence and uncovers the multi-faceted and layered universes that transcend realism and delusion, giving consideration to objects and occurrences beyond their useful functions or mundane appearances. Ang's work has been shown at the Institute of Contemporary Art and Osage Gallery, both in Singapore. She was an artist-in-residence at the Rijksakademie, Amsterdam and graduated from the School of Visual Arts.

### 105 | ALEXANDRA NAVRATIL | SWITZERLAND

Alexandra Navratil is currently based in Amsterdam and presents new work in video and drawing, which examines the historical and political concepts of perception. She graduated with a MFA from Goldsmiths College, London in 2007 and received the Swiss Art Award in 2009. She has been an artist-in-residence at the Irish Museum of Modern Art (IMMA), Dublin and recently exhibited her work at Fermcontent, London; Lothringer13/Laden, Munich; MUSAC, León and Galeria Angels, Barcelona.

### 106 | SUNGYEON PARK | SOUTH KOREA

Sungyeon Park is based in Seoul. Her artistic practice is multi-disciplinary and conceptually driven. Park's subjects come from small voices within ordinary lives and she is concerned with social issues related to visual language and individual experience. Park has received several grants including an Emerging Artist Fellowship in 2006, Arts Council Korea Grant, and a Gyeonggi Cultural Foundation Grant. She participated in the Art Omi International Artists Residency in New York.

### 107 | ARMANDO MARIÑO CALZADO | CUBA

Armando Mariño Calzado is currently based in New York and shows his recent paintings in Open Studios. These works comment on the representation and visual consumption of violence inflicted by nature or humankind. Taking explicitness, immediacy and omnipresence as essential aesthetic values in contemporary society, his work reflects on the role of painting with respect to current aesthetics of violence.
