Cary Leibowitz's oeuvre intertwines complex questions with a camp sense of humor. On this limited edition charm made exclusively for ISCP, he devalues self-esteem, that crucial element of human mental health, to a paltry five cents. In a witty parallel play, the individual pieces are being sold for the starting price of 99 dollars each. The price of the piece will then continually increase after every 20 editions are sold.

Cary Leibowitz, also known as "Candy Ass," is an American multi-media artist and painter recognized for his fusion of social and deeply personal issues through art. One *Artforum* reviewer, Alex Jovanovich, called him "that rare miserabilist who has the self-awareness and dexterity of mind to transform his sadness into some of the most thoughtfully conceived comedy out there." Leibowitz's work has been shown at institutions including the Indianapolis Museum of Art, Indianapolis; Guggenheim Museum, and MoMA PS1, New York; and is in the permanent collections of Chase Manhattan Bank, Hirshhorn Museum and Sculpture Garden, and the Jewish Museum, among others. He is represented by Invisible-Exports in New York.
