Untitled, from the series Acts of Appearance, is a limited edition created exclusively for ISCP by Indian photographer Gauri Gill. In this ongoing body of work begun in 2015, Gill works closely with the paper mâché artists of the Kokna tribe in Maharashtra, using the unique masks they make. Her aim is to tell fictional stories that are improvised together with them, evoking contemporary life in the village. Gill's work addresses the twinned Indian identity markers of class and community as determinants of mobility and social behavior; in it there is empathy, surprise, and a human concern about issues of survival. In this staged photograph, the two individuals wear expressive papier mâché masks that represent anthropomorphic versions of the sun and moon. The Acts of Appearance series was presented in a solo project exhibition at MoMA PS1 in 2018.

Gauri Gill (born 1970, Chandigarh, India) is a contemporary photographer based in New Delhi whose practice includes an almost two-decade long engagement with marginalized communities in rural areas of India. Gill earned a BFA (Applied Art) from the College of Art, New Delhi; BFA (Photography) from Parsons School of Design/The New School, New York; and MFA (Art) from Stanford University, California. She has exhibited within India and internationally, including the Venice Biennale 2019; MoMA PS1, New York; Documenta 14, Athens and Kassel; Kochi Biennale; 7th Moscow Biennale; Wiener Library, London; and Whitechapel Gallery, London. Her work is in the collections of prominent institutions worldwide, including the Museum of Modern Art, New York; Tate Museum, London; the Smithsonian Institution, Washington; and Fotomuseum, Winterthur. In 2011 she was awarded the Grange Prize, Canada's foremost award for photography.
