Border Sky is a limited edition archival print by Mumbai-based artist Shilpa Gupta. The photograph was shot by Gupta at the Bangladesh-India border, a high-surveillance state line running over 4,000 kilometers between the two countries. The image renders the sky photographed in different tonalities representing our multiple internal beings and the impossibility of harnessing ourselves under the category of the national state. *Border Sky* deals with multiplicity and celebrates the many ways of seeing the world. In her practice, Gupta is drawn to how places, people, experiences get defined. Her work engages with zones where these definitions play out, such as borderlines, labels and thoughts of censorship and security.

Shilpa Gupta (born 1976, Mumbai, India) lives and works in Mumbai, where she studied sculpture at the Sir J. J. School of Fine Arts from 1992 to 1997. She participated in the 58th Venice Biennale exhibition *May You Live in Interesting Times* in 2019, with a spectacular room-sized installation, and her photographs were included in the 2018 MoMA exhibition, *Being: New Photography*. Gupta's work has been shown in leading international institutions and museums such as Tate Modern, London; Museum of Modern Art, New York; Louisiana Museum; Centre Pompidou, Paris; Serpentine Gallery, London; Fondazione Sandretto Re Rebaudengo; Turin, Mori Art Museum, Tokyo; Solomon R. Guggenheim Museum, New York; and Kiran Nadar Museum, New Delhi. Her art is in the collections of the Solomon R. Guggenheim Museum, New York; Centre Pompidou, Paris; Mori Art Museum, Tokyo; La Caixa Contemporary Art Collection, Spain; Louis Vuitton Foundation, Paris; and Asia Society and Museum, among many others.
