Spring 2022 Sponsor Update

Dear friends and colleagues,

With Spring Open Studios fast approaching, questions about art installation, activism, cultural exchange and "Where's Ian*?" are all heard resonating throughout the hallways of ISCP.

During the past two utterly tumultuous and difficult years, ISCP's staff and board have engaged in self-scrutiny, continued to create a diverse and equitable organization, worked to bring about change from within, while reaching out to collaborate and share resources with other institutions. We have brought residents from culturally underfunded areas, with the knowledge that differing individual artistic insights, experiences and perspectives feed and nurture one another.

We cherish our time-honored collaborations with long-term sponsors and supporters, and continue to build new ways of serving artists, curators, and the public. We have stayed safe and healthy

throughout this ongoing pandemic with very few exceptions, observing strict protocols. New York's resilience during this time, and its extraordinary cultural multiplicity are deeply sustaining to us, especially now, when we hope to gather more frequently and safely in person.

Spring Open Studios coincides with the opening of the Venice Biennale this year, where nine ISCP alumni are representing their countries in national pavilions, and a tenth alumna is showing in the main exhibition. I imagine many of our residency sponsors are already in Venice preparing their own vernissage celebrations. Meanwhile here in Brooklyn, we welcome new visitors to come see what's happening at ISCP.

39 residents are here from 28 different countries, ready to talk about their art and projects with all who venture into their individual workspaces on April 22nd and 23rd. Two deeply inspiring exhibitions recently opened in our galleries: *Lizania Cruz: Every Immigrant Is a Writer/Todo Inmigrante Es un Escritor* on the second floor, and *Sharon Norwood's Drawing Room* in the project space on the first floor. Cruz's exhibition explores individual and collective experiences of Black immigrants and first-generation Black Americans, while Sharon Norwood's installation, curated by Dr. Petrina Dacres, exploits the decorative intentions and joys of mark-making and gesturing, simultaneously disrupting the White gaze and other passive notions of viewing "the other." Vastly different in methodologies and aesthetic approaches, both exhibitions draw the viewer right in with their visual allure, while uncovering topical and timely political and social questions.

The following pages give a snapshot of our year so far, providing information on all the artists and curators in residence, generous funders and supporters, collaborators and current budget.

On the evening of April 22nd, we will be dedicating our new Lawrence Weiner Memorial Studio in honor of the late Conceptual artist. Alice and Lawrence Weiner have been steadfast supporters of the Ground Floor Program begun in 2015. ISCP celebrates their vision and generosity.

Our guest speaker will be New York City Council Member Chi Ossé, the city's new Chair of the Committee on Cultural Affairs, Libraries, and International Intercultural Groups. We share his belief in the arts as a healing force. We hope you too will be able to join us—if not now, then another time in the future.



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


